

Appalachian Plateau

The Appalachian Plateau region of Georgia is in the very northwest corner of the state.



Appalachian Plateau


A plateau is a high area of land with flat tops.

Appalachian refers to the chain of mountains that stretches from Georgia to Maine.



Appalachian Plateau

In the Appalachian Plateau, there are several flat topped mountains which drop steeply into long valleys.



Valley and Ridge

The valley and ridge region is in the northwest part of Georgia and part of the Appalachian Mountains.

This region is made up of narrow ridges next to open valleys.




Valley and Ridge

A valley is a low area between mountain ridges.





A ridge is a high, narrow area in a

The Blue Ridge region is a mountainous area in northeast Georgia.






- The Blue Ridge Mountains are part of the Appalachian Mountain Range.
- The Appalachian mountains are the <u>oldest</u> mountains in North America.

Georgia's highest mountains are called the **Blue Ridge** Mountains. They have a bluish haze.




Mountains are very high areas of land.

The highest mountain in Georgia is Brasstown Bald Mountain. It is in the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Piedmont means 'foothills' - its at the foc of the mountains.



This region has green rolling hills and red clay.






