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## Social Studies Standard:

SS2CG1 The student will define the concept of government and the need for rules and laws.

- A government is a group of leaders who write laws to help keep everyone safe.
- A law is a rule you must follow in the <u>community</u> in order to be safe.
- A rule is something you must follow at home or school in order to be safe and learn.
- Examples of laws are stopping at a stop sign, wearing a bicycle helmet, wearing a seat belt, no littering, and driving the speed limit.
- Examples of rules at school are walking in the hall, not chewing gum, following directions,
   being a good listener, and keeping your hands to yourself.
- When we choose <u>not</u> to follow the rules and laws, we have consequences.
- A consequence is the punishment for not following the rule or law so one can learn from the mistake.
- A consequence for not following a rule at school is having to do your work during recess if you chose to play during work time.
- A consequence for not following a rule may be having time out to think about one's actions.
- A consequence for not following a law such as driving to fast is paying a fine.
- A fine is having to pay a certain amount of money.
- A consequence for not following a law such as stealing may be going to jail.
- Enforce means to make sure the rules and laws are followed.
- Parents and teachers enforce the rules at home and school.
- Police officers enforce the laws to make sure everyone is safe.
